In Detail

Y8

It's official, we have a Y8 service that runs between Wotton and Yate and thanks to the indomitable Barbara Lawrence now starts at 7.15am and will begin in September. The timetable should be published by August 11th.

There aren't words for the effort and determination that has gone into this. Proof that it's best never to give up! Thank you to GCC, South Glos and WECA and David Redgewell.

Walking to school / Road safety

This is a priority across my area. We want children to be able to walk to their school wherever possible. This month the Kingswood Parish Clerk and I met with the Highways Safety Team and the Think Travel Team to look at how we make the roads safer for children walking to KLB from Wotton and Kingswood as well as all the primary schools. We also discussed concerns in North Nibley. We will be considering initiatives which encourage a park and walk solution to keep cars away from the school entrance and minimise traffic where there are greatest concentrations of children. Discussions continue about school crossing patrols and alternative ways of groups of children walking to school together. We are undertaking speed surveys to push for additional VAS units and planning a glow in the dark campaign for when clocks go back.

OK path reminder – This path was put in to prevent a further tragedy, please can I ask that parents/carers remind KLB pupils of the vital importance of using this route. Do not use the outer path. I will be arranging for signage as a reminder at the start of the term. The hedges will also be cut back. Sometimes the path does get muddy, dirty shoes are a small price to pay for safety.

Parking

I know that despite the frustrations everyone rather enjoyed the peace of some of our roads being closed during the works on Rushmire Hill but now it's open again it's time to remember what double yellow lines mean and the importance of parking sensibly to allow larger vehicles to get through – this of course includes fire engines and ambulances. If you're visiting St Mary's, please park considerately and don't park in front of the dropped kerbs with tactile paving – it's an offence. If you're dropping off at Synwell Playing Field for football, please park thoughtfully. My email is full of complaints from residents but also concern that the volume of traffic puts all the children attending for football or to use the playground at risk. I've been in touch with the PCSOs (police community support officers) and they will attend if we can't get this under control. The right-hand pavement as you head up Long Street is also not a car park. Please don't park outside the fish and chip shop.

Drains

Some residents have been horribly affected by the torrential rains, and we have new springs appearing across the county.

Where we have recurring problems, I am putting in place more major pieces of work, but these do take time.

Keeping our drains clear makes a huge difference to residents who live at the bottom of our hills, but this relies on everyone to keep drains clear of leaves. The dry summer means that we are already seeing drains clogged with leaves. Please clear any you see outside or near your property e.g clearing a drain on Ellerncroft Road can save a house on Ludgate Hill finding their cellar full of water.

County Council Children's Services judged Good with Outstanding elements by Ofsted

Gloucestershire County Council's Children's Services have been judged as Good with Outstanding elements in its most <u>recent inspection</u>.

During the inspection, which took place from June 9 to 20 this year, the inspection team found the council's Children's Services to be Good in its overall effectiveness, with judgements of Outstanding in two of four categories, and good in the remaining two categories.

Services showed significant improvement since the last full inspection when they were judged to require improvement in 2022.

Ofsted found that 'children in care experience exceptional care and support' and that those who need help and protection 'benefit from high-quality, effective early help services'.

The experiences and progress of children in care was judged to be Outstanding by inspectors. They found that 'children enter care at the right time and live in stable homes where they are well supported, and their needs are met'.

Leaders were also singled out for praise, where their impact on social work practice with children and families was found to be Outstanding. Ofsted said that leaders 'have been relentless in their ambition to improve children's lives... systematically creating the conditions for success.', adding that, 'as a result, social work practice is now strong in all areas and the experiences and progress of vulnerable children are much improved'.

Fire safety advice when cooking

As part of the Fire Kills campaign, Gloucestershire Fire and Rescue Service is encouraging parents and carers to make any kitchen activities a chance for children to learn about cooking safety.

With the summer holidays fast approaching, many children across Gloucestershire will be spending more time in the kitchen.

Whether they're lending a hand or simply seeking a snack, it's important to make sure that they know the hazards of a hot hob.

The Fire Kills campaign's top tips for staying safe in the kitchen this summer are:

- Take care if you need to leave the kitchen whilst cooking. Take pans off the heat or turn them down to avoid risk.
- If a pan catches fire, don't take any risks Get out, stay out, and call 999.
- Double check the hob is off when you've finished cooking. Remember halogen / induction hobs remain hot. Don't touch them until they're cold.
- Keep tea towels and cloths away from the cooker and hob.
- Take care if you're wearing loose clothing this can easily catch fire. Avoid leaving children in the kitchen alone when cooking. Keep matches and saucepan handles out of their reach to keep them safe.
- Take care with electrics keep leads and appliances away from water and place grills away from curtains and kitchen rolls.
- Keep your equipment clean and in good working order. A build-up of fat and grease can ignite a fire.
- Don't cook after drinking alcohol.
- Hot oil can catch fire easily be careful that it doesn't overheat.
- Never throw water on a chip pan fire.
- In the event of a fire, have an escape plan in place.

- Don't take risks by tackling a fire. Get out, stay out and call 999.
- Get at least one smoke alarm on every level of your home and test them monthly.
